What Is Life?

This is what the great musician and songwriter, King David, said about life: "As for us. Our life is like grass. As the Psalmist tells us, life is just like a wild flower: we are here today and gone tomorrow. We are born, we grow old, we die, we are buried, and our bodies decay. That's the way it is. Millions before us have died, and if the Lord tarries long enough, millions after us also will die. Let's not fool ourselves, my friend, this is the reality of human life. Death is one appointment which must be kept by every single human being; no one will be able to escape.

Life is a journey, and like any other journey, it has a beginning and an end.

Life also is an investment—it can be an investment in life itself, or it can be an investment in death. The choice, my friend, is solely yours.

At midnight on December 31, 1999, the whole world celebrated the dawning of a brand new century, some with much anticipation, many with hope for the future, and the majority with fear for the uncertain. Whatever your frame of mind was on that night, the hard cold fact is this: Not one single person who welcomed in the new century on December 31, 1999 will be here on this planet to herald in the twenty-second century on December 31, 2099. There is absolutely no doubt—we will all be dead by then. September 11, 2001 was a beautiful Tuesday morning in New York City and Washington, D.C., but this date will be permanently etched in the minds of people all over the world for many years to come. It is laid down then, in the laws of nature, that human life should average about seventy years, and if we take care of our bodies, we might enjoy about forty good ones. All of us who are over

Yes, the hair begins to gray or to thin out, and wrinkles begin to appear all over the face, and so on. If you are over forty, take a look in the mirror and compare what you see with a photograph you took maybe twenty years ago, and you will see that I am telling the truth. Let us take a look at a typical man. Today you see him reaching his peak at age 35: big, strong, energetic, filled with dreams and aspirations, ready to conquer the world. That's what human life is all about. The inevitable must happen: you will die, your body will decay, and it will go back to the earth from whence it came. There is absolutely nothing that you or anyone else can do about it. Let's not fool ourselves, my friends, there is only one certainty in life: death. It doesn't make the slightest difference who you think you might be on this earth, or what you might possess; when your time comes, you are still going to die.

With this in mind, why, then, do we spend so much of our time and energies in this somewhat useless quest for material prosperity if all the things that we take so much pride in owning today, will one day belong to someone else who did not even work for them? Yes, my friend, we are all mortal beings, and in the light of God's infinity, our earthly possessions are really of no significance at all.

No matter how rich you are and how important you think you may be on this planet, you will never be able to defeat the laws of nature. When your time comes, you will die, and your body will decay. Yes, that day is coming for every single one of us, when we will cease to walk upon the surface of the earth. Instead, we will be lying beneath it. That day might be sooner than many of us think. As the Psalmist tells us: "A man's greatness cannot keep him from death; he will still die like the animals" (Ps. 49:12).

If this was all that life had to offer us, it would be totally useless, and would really make no sense at all. Fortunately, my friend, life can mean so much more than this, and there is a bright hope for every single human being.

When you come right down to it, life is really a matter of choices; it's all about making the right choices. If the right choices are made, life can be full of meaning, because every single human being was put on this planet for a purpose, with each person given the opportunity to make a positive contribution to humanity. Some people discover that purpose, whereas many do not. To discover one's real purpose in life, one has to look towards the spiritual things—the things of God. These things are eternal, but also serve to enrich this life of mortal existence.
